Introduction

God's presence and dwelling place among mankind has always been a thing. It is deeply embedded into who He is, His mission, and how he connects with His creation. God's presence is stitched into the biblical narrative so that it is clearly part of His story.

Eden was the dwelling place of God, and God commissioned Adam and Eve to expand the boundaries of that dwelling place to fill the earth (Genesis 1:28). While God's original call seemed to be thwarted by sin, God continues to establish his dwelling place in different forms which will shown throughout this devotional.

God continued to establish his dwelling place among the patriarchs until the building of the tabernacle and temple. After Solomon's temple was destroyed, the prophets anticipate the coming of a new and expanding temple, and these prophecies would be fulfilled in Jesus and the church. The church as the dwelling place of God would expand until one day it filled the entire heaven and earth—the entire cosmos would become the dwelling place of God.

The mission of God did not begin with the Great Commission recorded in Matthew 28:18-20, but mission is God's heartbeat from Genesis 1 until the new heaven and earth become the dwelling place of God in Revelation 21-22. This grand picture of the whole earth filled with God's presence fulfills God's original intention from the sanctuary of Eden. So that is where we begin.

1 READ

GENESIS 2:8-15. Now the LORD God had planted a garden in the east, in Eden; and there he put the man he had formed. The LORD God made all kinds of trees grow out of the ground—trees that were pleasing to the eye and good for food. In the middle of the garden were the tree of life and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil.

A river watering the garden flowed from Eden; from there it was separated into four headwaters. The name of the first is the Pishon; it winds through the entire land of Havilah, where there is gold. (The gold of that land is good; aromatic resin and onyx are also there.) The name of the second river is the Gihon; it winds through the entire land of Cush. The name of the third river is the Tigris; it runs along the east side of Ashur. And the fourth river is the Euphrates.

The LORD God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it.

PBIGIDEA

Eden had everything anyone could have ever wanted. It had a flowing river, a lush garden planned and planted by God, and delicious and abundant fruit ripe for the picking. It was beyond beautiful. Eden was the picture of peace and life. It isn't too much to say that it was perfect. In Hebrew, it meant "pleasure" or "delight."

What made Eden most delightful was that God was there. Eden was the locus of God's presence, provision, and protection. It wasn't just a garden; it was the very first dwelling place of God on Earth. It was a paradise, a sanctuary, a place of worship, and a natural temple where heaven met earth.

God created Adam and Eve and placed them within Eden, which became their home. God was no stranger, as "God himself walked in the garden in the cool of the day..." (Genesis 3:8). God and man were freely and wholly woven in relationship. God walked with men and talked with them as a friend and as a Father.

There was nothing between them. Until they disobeyed and listened to another voice other than the One who meant to protect them. As a consequence, God expelled them from Eden. It was a

consequence that had a grave affect that untethered the relationship between God and man.

One could be tempted to believe that God stayed within the garden and kicked the first couple to the curb, but that isn't true. Though Adam and Eve were forced from the Garden, God would never leave them. Ever since mankind has been longing to get back to Eden to dwell in God's presence.

As we dwell with God, we taste Eden. Eden isn't a place we want to go and stay, but it is also a place we want to go and invite others to come along with us.



DAY 2 PILLAR



One great law for all who would be truly led by God's **Pillar** of cloud and fire, is to take no step at the bidding of self-will or without the clear moving of the heavenly Guide. PBIGIDEA

Yahweh is God-with-his people. When it comes to His presence, God takes the initiative. One of the greatest realities of God's presence is the way it leads and guides us.

Outside of the garden, people longed to know that God was still present among them. His voice in the garden was long forgotten and infrequent. The next time that God would show a sign of His presence was when God led his people from bondage in Egypt to the Wilderness. In the wilderness, the people had nothing except what God provided for them. They left the only life they had ever known. With that in mind, God had to show Himself to them.

God would lead and guide his people with a pillar of fire by day and a pillar of cloud by day. Wherever they were in the wilderness, they could see the pillar at all times. The wilderness could be pretty dark at night, other than the light of the moon, but God's presence being pillar-shaped would offer plenty of continual light, a constant reminder of His presence, care, and leadership.

The people had no GPS or directional awareness in the wilderness. They were lost unless the Lord showed them them way. And He did. Whenever the pillar moved the people would move. Whenever the pillar stopped the people would stop.

God's presence in the pillar served as a tangible sign for His people of divine guidance, protection, and assurance.

God's presence is often obscured by the elements of fire and cloud.* When God's presence is made visible, whether through fire, cloud, or some other manifestation, it means there was a human encounter with the transcendent God.

The arrival of the *Shekinah* glory testifies that the Lord has entered His earthly dwelling place to be present with His people (e.g., Exodus 40:34-38; 2 Chronicles 7:1-3)—and yet its description is one of nearness and separation. His presence combines awe and terror and simultaneously invites approach and distance.

God is present and active in the way He leads and guides His people, even if the path seems unclear or unconventional. Two whole generations enjoyed and were comforted by visibly seeing and experiencing God within a vast wilderness.

READ

Exodus 25:8-9, 29:45-46 "And let them make me a sanctuary, that I may dwell in their midst. Exactly as I show you concerning the pattern of the tabernacle, and of all its furniture, so you shall make it."

PBIGIDEA

In the Exodus story, there are two central elements to God's redemptive presence—removal and placement. God removed His people from the harsh realities of Egypt and placed them in the wilderness to journey with them to the promised land. Along the way, God showed His presence to them. Wonderfully, He entered history to bring His people to Himself.

As God led and guided his people with a pillar, He drew up a blueprint for His people to build a tent called the tabernacle or *Mishkan*, which comes from the Hebrew word meaning "to dwell." God had already permanently dwelt among His people, but the tent would symbolize that right before their eyes. It would also be a template for a more permanent temple that would be built in the future.

The tabernacle became a mobile marker to where God was among His people. God would dwell within the tent's central room behind a curtain. That room was called the Holy of Holies. Within that room, there were special and symbolic furnishings, which included the ark of the covenant. Above the arc is where the Spirit of God dwelt.

This tent at the center of Israel's camp was a constant reminder that God was with his people to care for, rule, define, and redeem them. It also serves as a future pointer to His forever presence with all His people.

The tabernacle's design revealed and showcased a unique tension. God's holiness required separation. This is why the tabernacle was arranged the way it was. The sanctuary was divided into the three concentric sections of the outer court, the Holy Place, and the Most Holy Place. Only in the Most Holy Place do we find God's presence. This is a room set apart from the rest of the tabernacle by a thick veil, a room never to be entered except once a year on the Day of Atonement, and then only by the high priest after his purification. God engineered the tent and its rooms to express both his nearness to redeem and the distance of his eschatological presence. The tabernacle, therefore, provides a way for God to be with sinners for their redemption while simultaneously protecting sinners from God's holiness.

The tent was a picture of big things yet to come, and also exemplified God's mission for His people. It would not remain in one place, but it was meant to expand and fill the earth so that all humanity might worship the glory of God. In this manner, the tabernacle provided not only the means for our worship and showcasing His presence, but it was the impetus for the people's mission as a light to the nations.



PBIGIDEA

God is with us. This has always been a marker of God, from the garden to the wilderness. He is a God who is with His People.

When Jesus was born He was called by a unique name, which fulfilled what the Lord had said through the prophet Isaiah said, "The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel" (which means "God with us").*

The apostle John said that in Jesus was the Word who became flesh and tabernacled among us. Paul said that the fullness of deity dwelt in Jesus in human form. Jesus said to Philip that the one who had seen him, Jesus, had seen the Father.

The presence of God which once was mediated by fire, cloud, and smoke, now stood face-to-face with His people. The pillar and tabernacle always pointed to something greater, to Someone greater, for ultimately God's true temple was Jesus Christ. Jesus planned to come and destroy the temple and to focus the attention of God's presence on Him, His death, and His resurrection (John 2:18-22). He aimed to turn attention from a building to a Person. Jesus was now the new temple.**

Jesus would become the Cornerstone that the people would reject (Matthew 21:42-44). In this new temple of Christ, the deity dwells in man and among men for redemption and reconciliation (Colossians 2:9). The amazing beauty of this is that God came among us, as one of us, to save us.

It is no coincidence that Jesus is right in the middle of this study. He is the climatic center. Jesus, God Himself, with skin on walked among His people. All along God had the plan to step into His creation, dwell among His people, show them the heart of God, and reveal His redeeming plan. You couldn't be more present with God than with Jesus.





READ

P BIG IDEA

In the wilderness, God's presence dwelled in a mobile tabernacle and later a temple. These sacred spaces were central to the people's worship and identity. But Jesus introduced something radically new: once the temple veil was torn, God's presence would no longer be confined to a building.

Before Jesus died and was resurrected, He promised to send a Helper who would indwell His followers. The Helper would be Himself–His Spirit. As individuals, we are a temple of the Holy Spirit, but collectively, as the Body of Christ, we are God's home on earth–a place where His Spirit lives, moves, and ministers.

The church is not the structure, not the programs, but the people. We are called "living stones" (1 Peter 2:5), being built into a spiritual house. Just as the pillar of cloud and fire were a type of foreshadowing of the Holy Spirit's presence and guidance in the lives of believers, the church is called the pillar and foundation of the truth (1 Timothy 3:15).

This reality should awaken awe and action in us. If God dwells within us, then the way we love one another, pursue unity and live out holiness deeply matters. The church is not just a gathering place; it is the dwelling



of the Living God. His Spirit empowers us to be His hands and feet, His heart and voice, in a broken world.

In actuality, we are priests who always dwell in the midst of God's tabernacling presence. May this color everything we think, say, and do. Wherever the Church goes, the presence of God is carried—into neighborhoods, workplaces, schools, and even across nations.

When Jesus commissioned his people to go into all the nations, He told them to obey and proclaim everything He taught. It was no small thing that He promised His presence would always be with them (Matthew 28:18-20). We are the place where heaven touches earth, not because of who we are, but because of Who dwells and abides within us.

READ

REREAD

PBIGIDEA

From the moment we pick up a book and begin reading a story, we eagerly anticipate how it will end. It's no different with God's story. In His story, the ending is when everything will be made right and restored to how it was meant to be.

Since Genesis 3, mankind has longed to be back in Eden where God's presence was lost due to the sin of Adam and Eve. Later God departed from Jerusalem when the temple veil was torn following the death of Jesus. These were always temporary dwelling places for God. God had always prepared a permanent place for His people to dwell with Him called Zion, the New Jerusalem. It is a city where there is no night, and there isn't any need for the sun or the moon because the light comes from the Lord and the Lamb.

What makes the New Jerusalem new? What makes it heavenly and glorious? What makes it more desirable than anything you have ever experienced? Simple. It is the presence of God. Zion is the place where God is, God reigns, He fills the temple and paradise returns.

Revelation 21-22 shows, a better city, one that descends from heaven, rests atop the mountain, and will forever be the center of God's relational presence.


The Bible's story is not unlike a mountain. Each story or book builds on another to form a larger and grander story, the way ridges and valleys build on each other to create the majestic mountain. From the top, one can see the whole landscape, and it makes sense.

The beauty and clarity of God's story are unmatched. In *The Chronicles of Narnia*, we hear Aslan boomingly inviting us to "Come further up! Come further in!" It leaves us breathless. It shakes us to the soul. We ache to ascend to Eden – but better is still in store.

God's desire to be relationally present is a major impetus for His redemptive mission. God's purpose and design for His dwelling place from the beginning of creation to the culmination of all things was to fill the entire heavens and earth—the cosmos. God begins and ends the history of redemption with His presence because the expansion and enjoyment of His presence for His glory is at the center of it all.



PORTION BIG IDEA

We are ambushed by countless demands and routines. Even our vacations can have an overwhelming, task-like edge. We can think, "If I only had more time." But is this the real problem? What we've really lost is the rest God gives and, with it, that part of Himself we can know only through wasting time with Him.

Rest is good. God set the tone and example. After six days of creating the universe, God took the seventh day and rested. Jesus, when pressed by the crowds, purposely pulled away and rested. We who are prone to grow weary are called to rest.

A common Hebrew word for rest is *Shabat*. This word stretches back to creation and was the name given to the seventh day of the week. God's rest was not born of exhaustion, but of completion, of delight in a world perfectly made. God intentionally tied shabat to a weekly rhythm for His people that included resting in His presence. God's aim for this day was that His people would work from their rest rather than work to rest.

Another word for rest in the Hebrew is *Nuach*. It can mean "rest" but it also means "settle". While Israel wandered in the wilderness they waited for a home

and a place to settle. They became nomads and camped for decades since their escape from Egypt. God promised His people a "resting place" in the land, a physical haven from their wanderings.

Yet, these rests were but shadows, pointing to a deeper, more profound rest. For Israel, even in the promised land, their rest was often disturbed by disobedience and unbelief. And for us, even the most perfect weekend getaway eventually gives way to the return of Monday morning's demands.

The Sabbath, whether a day or practice or promise, was always meant to point to Jesus who ultimately is our rest. The Lord of the Sabbath, Jesus, is the very embodiment of the rest we crave. He is the fulfillment of every Sabbath, every promise of a safe haven. He is the presence of God and our a place of rest.


